	Talk to your child and visit colleges and talk about careers and the requirements
for careers	
	Volunteer at your child's school.
	Check your child's homework daily. Ask students to see their homework and ask
for grading rubrics	
	Communicate frequently with your child's teachers
	Make sure students read at least one book every 2 weeks. Have them write or tell
parents what was learned.	
	Set aside time to read as a family.
	Use SAT vocabulary lists. Make sure your child learns 10 words each week.

	or test your child. For example, have the child use words in conversations. Visit classes of your child when grades are low. Monitor use of the internet. Do not allow cell phone use during study times Remind your child that cell phone use during school is against school policy. Parents should make sure they have thoroughly read school code of conduct book. Speak positively to your child and other children. Spend quality time and communicate with your child in a firm, supportive way Do not allow your child to turn in sloppy, illegible work. Arrange for your child to shadow a professional. Find mentors for your children.
